Beauty 2014, 14-18 July, 2014, Edinburgh UK

The 15th International Conference on B-Physics at Frontier Machines (Beauty 2014) will take place between 14th –18th July 2014 at the University of Edinburgh, UK.

The purpose of the conference is to review results in the field of B-physics and CP-violation, as well as to explore the physics potential of existing and upcoming B-physics experiments at frontier machines. We will have an exciting mixture of talks from theory/phenomenology and experimental results on many interesting topics, including CP violation, rare decays, spectroscopy and production of heavy flavoured B and charmed hadrons.

General Information:

The conference will be held in The Playfair Library, located within the Old College on South Bridge in Edinburgh. Participants will be able to get their registration packs from 09 -10 am on Monday 14th July. The first session will start at 10 am. The conference will finish at lunch time on Friday 18th July. Accommodation:

We have reserved en-suite rooms (Holland and Masson House) as well as at the Salisbury Green Hotel on the Pollock Halls campus of the University of Edinburgh. The accommodation is within walking distance of the Playfair Library. Nearby you'll find Hollyrood Park and Arthur's Seat which offers spectacular views over Edinburgh. Social Programme:

A conference dinner will be held at Dynamic Earth on Thursday 17th July 2014.

A half-day excursion to Edinburgh castle or the Forth Road bridges will take place on the afternoon of Wednesday 16th July 2014. On the evening of Monday 14th July 2014 a reception will be held in the Playfair Library. On Tuesday 15th July there will be an opportunity to sample whisky, which is Scotland's national drink.

Travel:

Edinburgh Airport is situated off the A8 to the West of the City. Approximately 30 minutes by taxi or car from Pollock Halls. There is an Airport bus from the airport to Waverley Station in the city centre. The fares on Airlink are £3.50 for a single ticket and £6 for an open return (change is given on the Airlink buses).

The nearest mainline station is Waverley Station in the centre of the City. Waverley Station is approximately 5-10 minutes taxi ride from Pollock Halls.

From Waverley Station, one can take the buses 30, 33, 48 or X48, which leave off Princes Street and pass by Commonwealth Pool next to Pollock Halls. .

Playfair Library:

The Old College once housed the whole University, but today it is the location of the School of Law, and of the Europa Institute, and is the centre of University administration. The Playfair Library Hall is situated on the south side of the College quadrangle. The hall with its barrel-vaulted ceiling spans more than 190ft in length and is regarded as one of Scotland's finest public rooms. The Hall was designed by William Playfair, known also for the design of the Royal Scottish Academy and National Gallery, situated adjacent to Princes Street Gardens, in addition to the National Monument on Calton Hill, and the city's Regent, Carlton, and Royal Terraces.

The University of Edinburgh:

For more than four centuries, our people and their achievements have rewritten history time and again.
